I AM THE VOICE Daring to be the voice that stands for and upholds the Truth!

A particular prime minister of a country outspoken and audacious heavily denounced the policies and atrocities of his predecessor who was a dictator. Once during a public meeting, as he censured the former dictator with stringent words, he was interrupted by a shout from a heckler in the audience: "You were one of the colleagues of the former dictator, isn't it? Why didn't you stop him then?" "WHO SAID THAT?" roared the prime minister! This thundering question bellowed and boomed causing an agonizing and fearful silence to prevail among the audience! Nobody dared to move a muscle! There was complete hush among them all. After a few moments of silence the premier softly replied: "Now you know why! I was afraid to have my voice heard... so that I could be safe!" The prime minister confessed his fear in "being a voice that was heard" so that he could shield his life and thus 'played safe!"

Mark 6:14-29 is however, in stark contrast to this trend with the presentation of the Bold and Courageous Voice of St John the Baptist who "made his voice heard" in standing and upholding the truth and who had to offer his life as a martyr for the Truth! Mark 6:14-29 presents before the Brutal Beheading of the Voice – St John the Baptist! The voice was powerful. The voice was a hope to many. The voice, however, also disturbed a few... disturbed even to the point of revenge and vengeance. And.....slit....! The voice was silenced!!

John the Baptist was a Prophet. And a True Prophet is a truth-teller! As we read in Mark 6:14-29, this True Prophet, John, was the whistle-blower in crying "foul" over the illegitimate relationship between King Herod and his brother's wife, Herodias. Herodias hated John the Baptist. Herodias hated him because he told the truth & she didn't like the truth. Herodias was determined to twist the truth into a lie and the lie into a truth. To silence the true voices of the society, is the bane of any generation. How many voices of correction by the parents are put to silence by disobedient children? How many voices of moral lives by the Church are put to silence by modernists and liberalists? How many voices of peace by innocent people are put to silence by fanatics and fundamentalists? How many voices of indiscrimination by the citizens are put to silence by a negligent government? How many voices-of-repentance by a spouse are put to silence by a drunkard or an irresponsible partner? How many voices of holiness by the Lord are put to silence, by superfluous spiritualities and comfy theologies? The Voice of Truth cries.....but how many of us seek to silence it!

Yes, the lives of Conscience movers and truth tellers are always at a risk. And this risk can even lead one to be a misfit in the society to be "different from others" to even risk one's life! St John the Baptist had the courage to be the truth -teller and even risk his life - to death. Thus, I humbly call upon each and every one to be a courageous truth-teller as John the Baptist; to tell the truth to the multitudes, without looking the outputs of it, as we're instructed in the 8th commandment of God. Also, since the truth is ONE, hence always the truth will set you free (Jn. 8:32).



Excerpt from...

OUR STRENGTHS, OUR VOCATION

Putting to effect all the abilities that the good Lord has blessed us with for His Kingdom, and being focussed on our Crucified Lord to be single-minded in our love for the Lord!

Every person's life consists of various strengths, talents, abilities and aptitudes. These strengths and talents help a person to achieve triumphs in life. These abilities and aptitudes push the person to climb up higher the ladder of success. However, it is said that "one's greatest strength can also be the reason for one's greatest fall!" Sometimes strengths and abilities themselves can become the reason for great depressions in life, the gateway to a person to be tempted into false ways, or to abandon one's true calling and vocation of life.

In Mt. 4:19, we read that Peter had received the glorious vocation of following the Lord, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." This was the vocation of Peter to follow Jesus closely and personally and intimately, to be a fisher of people, for the Kingdom of God. But when faced with the greatest crisis of his life, he sought comfort and refuge, in what was probably, humanly speaking, his greatest strength - fishing! All through his life, Peter was probably living close to the sea. He knew the depths and the breadth of the waters.

But now Peter, dejected and depressed, "leaves" this Divine vocation and goes back to his earthly strength and livelihood - fishing. His strength and ability of fishing had become the reason for great depressions in his spiritual life, the gateway to being tempted into false ways, leaving the way of the Lord, the entrance for him, to abandon his true calling and vocation of life of being fishers of men.

"One's greatest strength can also be the reason for one's greatest fall!" But once again, the Lord comes to the rescue. He had called Peter, for the first time, by the Sea of Galilee, by a miraculous catch of fish (Lk 5: 1-11). He now again calls Peter, by the Sea of Galilee, by a miraculous catch of fish, calls him to renew his commitment and love for the Lord, calls him to go back to his vocation and give up his life for him, calls him to leave his "earthly strength" of fishing, and to depend totally on the Lord!

The danger that Peter faced in his life can be a danger for us too. Our greatest strength can also be the reason for our greatest fall! What is the greatest strength of our lives? Money? Prestige? Talents? Abilities? Self-Confidence? Sometimes we find, that the very talents and abilities.... by which we are able to

do the works, of the Lord, may themselves, become great snares of temptations. We, therefore, need to be on the watch always, be on the guard at all times! Sure, that it is the Lord Himself who has blessed us with various talents. But all our capabilities, need to find its source, strength and continuity, in and by the Lord.

THE HIDDEN POWER

"But we hold this treasure in earthen vessels, that the surpassing power may be of God and not from us" (2 Cor 4:7).

Most of us prove failure when faced with different problems, but the truth we do not know or we often forget that there is the power lying hidden within us that can never fail before any problem. That power is God. There is only one way through which we can discover this power in our lives, and that is through prayer. According to St. Augustine; "He who learns to pray well lives well", also St. Vincent De Pores said; "A prayer is an interview of the soul with God, a mutual communication where in God speaks to the soul what he wishes it to know and accomplish".

Therefore, we can call prayer a nourishment for the soul. It is in prayer that we get to know the Lord personally, enter into union with him and accustom ourselves to His presence. In order to taste the power of prayer, we need to make it a habitual practice and so lead a Christ-like life. Prayer is as important to the soul as water is to the body. Without it, something feels empty inside. Sometimes we may be worrying that we do not know how to pray, or that sometimes it does not seem like God is listening. What is important in prayer is to always believe and trust that God knows what you need. So, we should never give up to pray. We need to pray always and with perseverance (Mat. 6:13).

Again, it is important to know that the highest expression of prayer is the Holy Mass, in which as the members of Christ's Mystical Body, we join the prayer of Jesus Himself to His Father, and through Holy Communion we enter into an intimate union with God. So, we ought to believe that when we communicate with God in prayer every daily and listen for what He has to say to us, we experience instant rewards from Him.

There are so many reasons why we must pray. We pray in imitation of Our Lord, who spent whole nights in prayer (Luke 6:12). Jesus prayed so often (Luke 5:6). We are told that He went to the deserts and mountains to pray; and moreover, He taught His own disciples to pray (Luke 11:1-4). We pray to ask for forgiveness and mercy for our wrongs. We pray to thank God for His

many blessings to us. We pray for the wisdom and for the knowledge of God's will in our lives. We pray for all our needs and those of others. Perhaps most importantly, we pray in order to grow in union with God.

*Ask and you will receive, so that your happiness may be complete... (Jn 16:24) *
